Since 2005, 11 college and university scholarships provided to our secondary school graduates

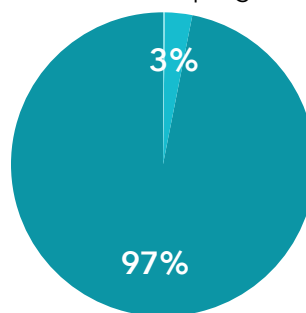

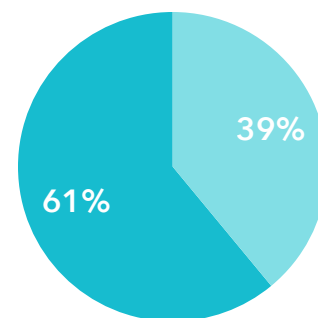
